

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THREE GO TO KOSOVO

Such is the way of the world. No sooner is the war over in Kosovo, and the news on our television screens focuses on another crisis, this time in East Timor.

But for three members of UNFICYP, the recently war-torn region of Yugoslavia is still very much on their minds. Having answered the UN's appeal for volunteers to serve in the new peacekeeping mission to Kosovo, the three are finishing their final preparations as the date for their scheduled departure, 6 October, rapidly draws near.

The three UNFICYP volunteers are Civil Affairs Branch office manager Klaus Höchtl, transport dispatcher Cyril Hames, and inventory/supply clerk Phivos Savvides.

Austrian Klaus has been working with the force for nine months after three previous tours here as a soldier in the Austrian Contingent. Hames, an Englishman, has been with the force for six years, while Phivos, a Cypriot, has over 20 years of UNFICYP experience.

Asked why they are going, all of them spoke of the new challenge it offered and of it being an adventure, while as one of them said, "You can't ignore the extra money."

But they will be spending a minimum of one year in Kosovo, and will be separated from their families for most of this time.

Now in their forties, none of them have young children to worry about - Cyril has a 21-year-old son while Phivos has a married 23-year-old daughter.

Klaus has no children and only recently got married. His personal circumstances in particular may have mitigated against his leaving his wife for such a long period so early on in their marriage, but he

has her blessing. "We will try and see each other every three months or so," he says. "We can meet in Thessaloniki. Northern Greece is beautiful, though I'm sure it's changed a bit from when I last saw it."

Cyril says his wife was never one for standing still and "supports me 101%."

Phivos says that his wife was "not very happy" when she first heard that he was considering volunteering, but she has come round to the idea. And as he stressed, Kosovo is "not too far away from home" - just a few hours by plane.

On the work front, none of them is sure what is awaiting them in Kosovo.

"This is the UN way, you can end up doing anything," Klaus says. Cyril expects to be employed "somewhere in the transport system".

However, all know that conditions will be very different to what they are used to in Cyprus.


First, there will be the fierce cold of a Balkan winter. "We will need to relearn how to put snow chains on vehicles," Klaus says.

"I can ski, so I'll be OK," Cyril jokes.

Klaus adds that he prefers the cold in any case because you can always dress for it, whereas you can only take so many clothes off in the heat.

He has already set a priority of acquiring a wood-fired heater, noting that wood will be plentiful over there.

While communications have largely been restored, there are frequent power cuts, and all know that little of the normality of everyday life in Cyprus will be awaiting them in Kosovo. As Klaus said, an 8.00 pm curfew may still be in force in many areas.

A veteran of seven peacekeeping missions as an Austrian soldier, Klaus' experience has already helped him in his preparations for this latest one.

For example, he mentioned the importance of taking a good First Aid box and other medical supplies, something which Phivos had not

thought of and said he would rectify.

By the end of their interview, they were discussing the possibility of sharing an apartment in Kosovo if they are based in the same area, and it was obvious that their excitement over their imminent departure was building.

EDITORIAL

Over the decades, The Netherlands has contributed military units and individuals to many peace keeping missions, including UNIFIL, MFO, UNAVEM, UNTAG, UNPROFOR, IFOR and SFOR. Recently KFOR and, of course, UNFICYP can be added to this list.

Since June 1998, for a period of three years, 100 Dutch soldiers form an integrated part of the British Roulement Regiment. Units of the Dutch Air Mobile Brigade have executed the first two six-month rotations, after which 13 Armoured Air Defence Battery was given the honour of joining the British 22nd Regiment Royal Artillery for a tour of duty with UNFICYP. A bi-national training was carried out at an early stage. This proved to be an excellent way to prepare for an integrated contribution towards UNFICYP's mission.

The Dutch contribution to UNFICYP consists of 103 personnel including 9 women. In order to improve the Dutch command and control over their unit, it was decided to give the Dutch a part of Sector 2 as their area of responsibility, effective June 1999.

Since then, a Dutch Major commands Sector 2 West Battery. It comprises Bengal troop, Falcon troop and the UK-staffed Irish Bridge troop, while it has formed its headquarters at "Ypenburg" (formerly known as Kingston). The Dutch contribution to the MFR remained unchanged: one troop.

The Dutch soldiers are happy to be members of the UNFICYP family, keen to learn about other cultures and proud to be united in the service of peace.

Durante décadas, los holandeses han contribuido con unidades militares y de forma individual a varias misiones de Mantenimiento de la Paz, incluyendo UNIFIL, MFO, UNAVEM, UNTAG, UNPROFOR, IFOR y SFOR. Recientemente KFOR y, obviamente, UNFICYP.

Desde Junio de 1998, por un período de 3 años, 100 soldados holandeses han integrado una parte del Regimiento Británico Rotativo. Unidades de la Brigada Aérea Móvil Holandesa han ejecutado la primera rotación de seis meses, después de que se haya integrado la 13ª Batería de Defensa Antiaérea al Regimiento 22 de Artillería Británico, para emprender una serie de tareas con UNFICYP.

Un entrenamiento bi-nacional se llevó a cabo como un primer paso. Esto demostró ser una excelente forma de preparar una acción integrada para contribuir siempre hacia la dirección de la misión de UNFICYP.

La contribución de Holanda a UNFICYP consiste en 103 soldados incluyendo a 9 mujeres. En orden de mejorar el comando y el control sobre sus unidades, fue resuelto entregar al contingente holandés, una parte efectiva del Sector 2 como área de responsabilidad, desde Junio de 1999.

Desde entonces, un Mayor holandés comanda la Batería Oeste del Sector 2. Esto comprende tropas Bengal, tropas Falcon y el staff Irlandés, al momento que estos últimos han formado su cuartel general en "Ypenburg" (formalmente conocido como Kingston).

La contribución holandesa a la MFR permanece sin cambios. Los soldados holandeses están felices de ser miembros de la familia de UNFICYP, agradecidos de aprender acerca de otras culturas y orgullosos de estar unidos en el servicio por la Paz.

Nederland heeft de laatste tientallen jaren zowel militaire eenheden als individuele militairen uitgezonden naar vredesmissies zoals UNIFIL, MFO, UNAVEM, UNTAG, UNPROFOR, IFOR en SFOR. Sinds kort kunnen daar KFOR en natuurlijk UNFICYP aan toegevoegd worden.

Sinds juni 1998 is een Nederlandse eenheid van 100 militairen, voor een periode van drie jaar geïntegreerd in het Britse Roulement Regiment.

Eenheden van de Luchtmobiele Brigade namen de eerste twee rotaties van zes maanden voor hun rekening. Daarna had 13 Pantser Luchtdoel-artillerie Batterij de eer zich aan te sluiten bij het 22nd Regiment Royal Artillery, voor een uitzending onder de vlag van UNFICYP.

Al in een vroeg stadium werd er gezamenlijk geoefend. Dit bleek een uitstekende manier te zijn om een geïntegreerd optreden bij UNFICYP voor te bereiden.

De Nederlandse bijdrage bestaat uit 103 militairen, waarvan er 9 vrouw zijn. Om de Nederlandse mogelijkheden tot 'command and control' te verbeteren, werd besloten om met ingang van juni 1999 de Nederlanders een eigen deel van sector 2 als gebied van verantwoordelijkheid te geven.

Sindsdien commandeert een Nederlandse majoor Sector 2-West Battery. Deze bestaat uit de pelotons Bengal, Falcon en het Britse Irish-Bridge. Daarnaast is er een hoofdkwartier onder de naam 'Ypenburg' (Voorheen 'Kingston').

De bijdrage aan de MFR bleef gelijk: 1 peloton.

De Nederlandse soldaten zijn blij bij de UNFICYP-familie te mogen behoren, leergierig waar het andere culturen betreft en trots om verenigd te zijn in dienst van de vrede.

DANISH STUDENTS VISIT UNFICYP



During their visit to UNFICYP on Wednesday 22 September, 30 Danish students were surprised by the level of responsibilities of soldiers, some younger than themselves, serving along the Buffer Zone.

Paul Kolken outlined UNFICYP's policy of trying to solve problems at the lowest possible level, the level of the gunner serving in his observation post. While walking along the green line in the old city of Nicosia, many aspects of peacekeeping in general, and about working with UNFICYP specifically, were addressed.

"It was surprising how many questions the students asked," said Major Kolken. "They clearly showed they were very interested in the work of a peacekeeping soldier, and they seemed to realise what impact a tour of duty has on one's personal life."

After the guided tour in Sector 2, the visitors were briefed on UNFICYP's mandate and about humanitarian tasks. Before the Danes had time to let all impressions sink in, they climbed OP 203 for a group picture.

YOPENBURG VETERAN DECORATES

During World War II, Dutchman Bart Dresens served with 13 Air Defence Battery, defending Ypenburg airfield against German attack. Last week, the very same Mr Dresens was the guest of the 13 Armoured Air Defence Battery, located in the Buffer Zone north of the old Nicosia International Airport.

The present battery upholds the traditions of the unit Mr Dresens served in, and by doing so, it maintains strong links with many living veterans.

"When the Dutch were given Sector 2 West as their area of responsibility, it wasn't difficult to think of a suitable name for our headquarters," says battery commander Major Wils Hein. "Formerly, it proudly carried the name 'Kingston', but with UNFICYP's permission, it will be Ypenburg from now on. I'm glad Mr Dresens, one of the veterans, could make the journey from his home in Spain to Cyprus to lead us in the official opening ceremony."

Cutting the ribbon wasn't the

PEACEKEEPING - AN IMPORTANT BUT FRAGILE ISSUE

The mandate of UNFICYP, established by the Security Council of the UN, is very clear. Our main task is to maintain the military status quo within the Buffer Zone. The Buffer Zone is a corridor of land - 180 km long, running across the island, of uneven width, sometimes several kilometres wide and sometimes only a few metres. And its edges are the two ceasefire lines as at 1800 hrs on 16 August 1974. UNFICYP, in very simple practical terms, holds those lines and the land in between, under control. We don't own it - obviously. But we control it. And we do so by consent. In fact, without the consent of the two opposing forces, UNFICYP could not be here and do its job.

El mandato de la UNFICYP establecido por el Consejo de Seguridad de las Naciones Unidas, es muy claro, siendo su tarea principal la de mantener el status quo militar dentro de la zona de amortiguación. La zona de amortiguación es una franja de territorio con una longitud de 180 km. a través de la isla, y de una anchura desigual que en algunas partes llega a ser de varios kilómetros y en otras solamente de unos cuantos metros. Desde las 18:00 horas del 16 de agosto de 1974, las orillas de esta franja son las dos líneas del cese de fuego. En términos prácticos y simples, la UNFICYP tiene estas líneas y superficie entre ellas bajo su control. Obviamente, la UNFICYP no es propietaria de este predio, simplemente lo controla con el consentimiento de las partes. De hecho, sin el beneplacito de las fuerzas opositoras, la UNFICYP no estaría aquí haciendo su trabajo.

The job requires the willing cooperation of the soldiers on both sides of the Buffer Zone. Both sides have to see it in their best interest to abide by the ceasefire. Only then can a lightly-armed peacekeeping force such as UNFICYP help opposing forces of much greater numbers of soldiers and armaments to avoid tension or renewed hostilities. Indeed, all peacekeeping operations of the UN round the world over the last 50 years are based on the consent of the parties. It is true sometimes that consent collapses, at which point the peacekeeping operation may have to withdraw. Or sometimes the consent erodes, in which case the peacekeepers try to keep a peace which is very fragile.

Para desempeñar su mandato, la UNFICYP requiere la cooperación de fuerzas militares estacionadas en las áreas adyacentes a ambos lados de la zona de amortiguación. Ambas partes deben reconocer que es en su propio beneficio el mantener el cese de fuego; únicamente así, puede una fuerza de mantenimiento de la paz, ligeramente armada como la UNFICYP, ayudar a que las fuerzas opositoras que cuentan con un mayor número de soldados y armas, eviten la tensión o reanudación de las hostilidades. Sin duda, la mayoría de las operaciones de mantenimiento de la paz de las Naciones Unidas, tienen su base en el consentimiento de las partes. Algunas veces el consentimiento fracasa, y es en estos casos cuando las operaciones de mantenimiento de la paz tienen que replegarse. Otras veces, el consentimiento se deteriora y en este caso los protectores de la paz hacen esfuerzos para mantener esa frágil paz.

Can peacekeeping succeed?

What makes a successful peacekeeping mission? I think there are six main factors:

1. A clearly defined and practical mandate.
2. Genuine and lasting consent of the opposing sides, and their understanding and acceptance of what the peacekeeping operation is there to do.
3. Respect for the principles of neutrality and impartiality.
4. The political support of the Security Council and other Member States with a special interest in the area.
5. Member States willing to provide military and police contingents and the funding needed for a peacekeeping operation.
6. Staying power - being prepared to be there for the long haul.

I believe peacekeeping by consent with its principles of neutrality and impartiality is one of the great inventions of our century.

Can peacekeeping succeed?

Ik denk dat er 6 belangrijke factoren nodig zijn voor een succesvolle vredesmissie:

1. Een duidelijk en praktisch mandaat;
2. Een oerchte en voortdurende instemming van de betrokken partijen, en begrip voor en acceptatie van de taak van de vredesmissie;
3. Respect voor de principes van neutraliteit en onpartijdigheid;
4. De politieke steun van de Veiligheidsraad en de lidstaten met een specifiek belang in de regio;
5. De bereidheid van lidstaten om militaire- en politie-eenheden te leveren alsmede de kosten te dragen van een vredesmissie;
6. Voortzettingsvermogen, de bereidheid om een langdurige bijdrage te leveren.

Ik geloof dat vredesmissies met instemming van partijen en met de principes van neutraliteit en onpartijdigheid een van de grote uitvindingen van deze eeuw zijn.



Peacekeeping - critical skills and disciplines

What we require in peacekeeping is a range of skills - patience, mediation, observation, anticipation, firmness, diplomacy and a willingness to work in a team, regardless of nationality. You have demonstrated those skills in your work here, and have shown great professionalism in carrying out your duties. The lowest ranking soldier standing in the hot sun on the line and the way he or she behaves and reacts is absolutely critical.

Peacekeeping also needs pride in what we do, and the discipline and the skills to perform with excellence. Each one of you represents not only the UN but also your home country. Bad behaviour damages the good name of both. That is why we strive for good discipline.

The cost of confidentiality

When the "shuttle talks" started in October last year, they did so, at the initiative of the Secretary-General, Kofi Annan. In his prior separate discussions with Mr Clerides and Mr Denktash, everyone had agreed that these talks should be confidential and outside the media. Such a decision, I personally believe, was a very wise one. It has, of course, a negative side. It means that I don't brief reporters and I don't talk about what I am doing. But, many people say to me, that is a very small price to pay. Many, many people - including reporters - tell me to keep up the confidentiality. That is the right approach and I will keep obeying my boss's instructions.

Peace settlement implies co-responsibilities

Over the past 35 years, the United Nations has often been blamed for failing to produce a solution. The international community can offer to help parties to solve a dispute, but it cannot do it for them. In the end, a peace settlement has to be negotiated between and signed by the parties themselves. Only they can determine whether they can live with a settlement and whether the settlement establishes the foundation for a peaceful and prosperous future. This cannot be imposed by outsiders. This also means there is co-responsibility which lies with the parties to find a mutually acceptable solution; the will to enter into the requisite "give and take".

On women's rights

From the day of its birth, the UN has fought for the equal rights of women. It has set up specialist agencies, so that women's issues and concerns did not get lost - as they so often do, in male dominated structures. The UN established the fundamental yardstick of human rights for women - the famous Convention for Women, with the very long name - the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women.

Our Secretary-General, Kofi Annan, is totally committed to the advancement of women. And so on 8 March, on International Women's Day, we in Cyprus look both backwards and forwards - backwards in history to see how far we have come, the victories and the landmarks.

And we look forward - for the journey is not over. There are so many more challenges for women. And we accepted that responsibility with a glad heart and with the sure knowledge that together, men and women, we will work for peace, health, and good lives for all of humanity, here and round the world.





VISIT TO THE HELLENIC COPPER MINES

Visitors to the mine

Personnel from Sector 1 had the opportunity this month to learn about some of the industrial activity of the island. Replying to a kind invitation from the mine authorities, a group of 34 officers and NCOs from San Martin Camp, Roca Camp and Brown Base visited the mine in front of Sector 1 HQ to be briefed about some of its features. The briefing showed us some unknown particularities related to copper extraction and the source of the mine.

Mining started here about 3,000 years ago. The production was then relative to requirements using old techniques. Skouriotissa's mine was reopened in 1992 by the Hellenic Copper Mines.

After a short historical sketch given by one of the engineers, we saw the whole process of copper being taken out from the heart of the mountain. From there, large pieces of rock containing 7% copper (a mine is income-producing when there is 4% copper) are transported over dump trucks to the grinding area. Then they are gathered in large heaps for the next stage of the treatment. Recent techniques have abandoned the fusion of copper in furnaces and have replaced this procedure with a chemical process. Finally, most of the copper products are exported, especially to the UK, Greece and Italy.

The visit was much appreciated, because it allowed us to increase our knowledge and understanding of this lovely country.

El pasado 8 de septiembre el personal del Sector I tuvo oportunidad de conocer una de las actividades industriales más relevantes de la Isla como es la explotación minera.

Así, respondiendo a la gentil invitación de las autoridades de la Hellenic Copper Mines, un grupo compuesto por el 2do Cte del Sector I y treinta y cuatro Oficiales y Suboficiales de los Campos San Martín, Roca y de la base Brown, concurrieron a las instalaciones de la mina ubicada frente al Puesto Comando de la FTA con el objeto de interiorizarse respecto de las particularidades del aludido emprendimiento industrial.

De la exposición que un ingeniero de la firma brindó al personal del Sector, surgieron aspectos que usualmente son desconocidos en torno a los procedimientos de extracción del cobre y los orígenes de la mina.

En tal sentido, es de destacar que la explotación del yacimiento se remonta en el pasado a casi 3,000 años aunque, claro está, en volúmenes mínimos acordes con las necesidades y las técnicas de esa época.

La etapa actual de la actividad de la mina de Skouriotissa comenzó en el

año 1992 con Hellenic Copper Mines.

Luego de la breve reseña histórica, pudo observarse todo el proceso de producción del cobre, desde el comienzo mismo de la extracción del mineral del corazón de la montaña.

Desde ese punto, los grandes fragmentos de roca contenido cobre en un 7% (una mina se considera económicamente rentable a partir de un contenido del 4%) son transportados en camiones de gran porte al sector de molienda, donde se reduce su tamaño para luego ser depositado en enormes montículos de cara a las siguientes etapas de su tratamiento.

Las técnicas modernas y la experiencia indicaron la conveniencia de dejar de lado la fusión del material en hornos, adoptando un proceso químico que conlleva mayores ventajas.

Finalmente, las placas de cobre que se obtienen en el proceso electrolítico se comercializan, exportándose la mayor parte de la producción a Gran Bretaña, Grecia e Italia.

Esta visita ha sido muy importante para todos nosotros, porque permitió incrementar nuestros conocimientos y comprender un poco más la historia de este encantador país.



CONFIRMATION AT TOMB OF SAINT BARNABAS

A holy confirmation was held at the tomb of Saint Barnabas this month. On 19 September, one of Sector 4's soldiers, Captain Valter Bosotina from Slovenia, and three students (one from the Ivory Coast and two from Cameroon), received the holy sacrament.

The site of the tomb of the apostle Barnabas is the most important shrine for Christianity in Cyprus. Barnabas, a Jew from Salamis, was the first known Cypriot convert. He, together with the Apostles Paul and Mark the Evangelist, brought the gospel to the island. They also organised the church and appointed bishops.

When Barnabas returned later to Cyprus, he became the Bishop of Salamis. During the persecution of the Christians by Emperor Nero, he was captured and then martyred. He

was buried with a handwritten manuscript of the gospel by Matthew. His remains were discovered by Anthemios, the Bishop of Constantia in 485 AD.

It is the second time that an officer of the Slovenian contingent has received the sacrament before leaving UNFICYP. Six months ago, Captain Videtic was confirmed, and he also had an Austrian godfather.

This time, Major Volkmar Ertl, the new Oi/c HQ Coy, was the sponsor of Captain Bosotina. Even at home, they are close friends. Valter is from Slovenia and Volkmar is from Carinthia, one of the southern parts of Austria, and both areas neighbour each other.

Captain Bosotina left UNFICYP on 28 September to return to his post in Slovenia.
